Washington/New Delhi: US President Donald Trump has said that PM Narendra Modi will do "what is right" on illegal immigrants, underlining that discussions are going on with India.

Making these remarks on Monday while speaking to reporters aboard Air Force One on his way back to Joint Base Andrews from Florida, Trump also mentioned that Modi is likely to visit the White House in Feb. Trump told House Republicans at a Florida retreat on Monday that the US would impose tariffs on countries that "harm" America, naming China, India, and Brazil as high-tariff countries. "We are

CISF to set up 1st women reserve battalion in Nuh

New Delhi: The Central Industrial Security Force (CISF) will establish its first Mahila Reserve Battalion in Nuh, Haryana, which is expected to meet the additional needs for deployment of women personnel in high-alert situations across its units in the Delhi-NCR.

The major CISF units in Delhi-NCR include those deployed at the Indira Gandhi International Airport, Delhi Metro Rail Corporation, Parliament House complex, central govt buildings, and eventually, the Jewar International Airport coming up in Noida.

"The establishment of the mahila battalion in Nuh is both cost-effective and operationally viable, ensuring that CISF can deploy trained personnel promptly to meet the requirements of its NCR-based units. The battalion will be equipped with modern security gadgets for policing needs," said a CISF officer. MHA approved the initiative to create 1,025 posts for the new battalion in Nov last year. TNN

Dehradun: PM Narendra Modi, while inaugurating the 38th National Games in the Uttarakhand capital on Tuesday, said that the Uniform Civil Code (UCC), implemented a day ago in Uttarakhand, "has the same team spirit as sports, and discriminates against none".

"Sportsmanship keeps us away from feelings of discrimination, helps us play with team spirit. This is the essence of UCC too. The law would become the foundation for the dignified life of our sisters, mothers and daughters. Democracy and the spirit of the Constitution will be strengthened by it. Sometimes, I even call it a secular civil code," the PM told the audience at the packed Rajiv Gandhi International Cricket Stadium in Rai-

pur area of Doon.

Earlier in his address, CM Dhami also mentioned UCC. "Under the leadership of the PM, we took the pledge in 2022 to implement UCC in the state. And on Jan 27, we implemented it," Dhami said.

Modi also said that India was making an all-out effort to get the hosting rights of the 2036 Olympics. "If we succeed in doing it, then sports in this country will attain new heights. Olympics is not just a sporting event—it boosts the overall economy of the particular country hosting it. It

helps in increasing tourism, development of infrastructure, transport sector and sports facilities, leading to job creation." he said.

Modi also flagged the issue of increasing obesity among people of the country. "It is worrisome because obesity also increases the risk of diabetes and heart-related ailments. To counter that, I urge citizens to squeeze out some time daily to exercise in whatever way possible. They should also focus on having a balanced and nutritious diet," he said.

Coldplay on lips, Modi says go big on 'gig' economy

Bhubaneswar: British band Coldplay's sell-out concerts in Mumbai and Ahmedabad struck a chord with PM Narendra Modi on Tuesday, prompting him to pitch India as a "concert economy" that could potentially generate huge revenue and employment with concerted public-private investment in infrastructure for live events, report Debabrata Mohapatra & Minati Singha.

"You might have seen fabulous pictures of the Coldplay concerts...Renowned international artists are increasingly drawn towards India," he said in Bhubaneswar. "In a country with such a rich heritage in music, dance and storytelling, with such a large pool of youth and a massive consumer base for concerts, there are vast opportunities for the concert economy. I expect the state and private sector to focus on the required infra and skills."

HOSTING 2036 OLYMPICS WILL TAKE INDIAN SPORTS TO NEW HEIGHTS, SAYS PM MODI

DEHRADUN, Jan 28 (PTI)

A MODEST but colourful opening ceremony showcasing Uttarakhand's religious heritage and bio-diversity kicked-off the 38th National Games here on Tuesday with guest of honour Prime Minister Narendra Modi reiterating his commitment to bring the 2036 Olympics to India during his address.

Around 10,000 athletes are gearing up to compete for podium finishes across 32 disciplines in the Gamesthat will run till February 14. Events will be held across seven cities of the hill state with Dehradun being the main venue.

Around 450 gold medals, and a similar number of silver and bronze medals are at stake.

Modi declared the Games open after the teams marched in and he was presented the flame at the ceremony.

"It is our endeavour to enhance your capabilities and we are focussed on supporting you. We consider sports an essential aspect in development of country," Modi told the gathered athletes at the ceremony.

"It is a beautiful portrait of 'Ek Bharat, Sreshth Bharat'," Modi said referring to the Games. The Prime Minister also used the opportunity to pass some health tips, urging youngsters to fight the growing menace of obesity by cutting down the oil in their food and adding more walks and exercise to their daily routines.

The ceremony started with a performance of 'Tandav', a classical dance form that is an ode to Lord Shiva. The Games were declared open with blowing of 2025 conches to mark the year.

Local favourite and popular Bollywoodsinger Jubin Nautiyal also performed during the ceremony.

Earlier, Modi arrived at the stadium riding on a decked-up golf cart along with Uttarakhand Chief Minister Pushkar Singh Dhami.

After taking around of the stadium, he was presented a traditional cap, shawl and a memento containing replicas of Games mascot 'Mauli' and the medals. An estimated 25,000 spectators have packed the Rajiv Gandhi International Cricket Stadium despite the chilly weather to catch the ceremony live.

The PM had also opened the last two editions of the Games in 2022 (Gujarat) and 2023 (Goa).

Uttarakhand Governor Lieutenant General Gurmit Singh, Union Minister of State for Sports Raksha Khadse, and Uttarakhand Sports Minister RekhaAryawere the dignitaries present on the occasion.

Most of the established sporting stars of the country such as javelin thrower Neeraj Chopra, shuttler PV Sindhu, shooter Manu Bhaker are giving it a miss, leaving the stage for other athletes to make a mark.

Four sports -- kalarippayattu, yogasana, mallakhambhand rafting -- will be demonstration (non-medal) sports.

With the theme of 'Green Games', the event aims to inspire individuals and organ-

isations to adopt eco-friendly and sustainable practices.

India's semiconductor market projected to reach \$103.4 billion by 2030

BHUBANESWAR, Jan 28 (IANS)

INDIA'S semiconductor market is projected to grow to \$103.4 billion by 2030, powering the over \$400 billion electronics market, the Indian Electronics and Semiconductor Association (IESA) said on Tuesday.

The government's targeted incentives for fabrication facilities (Fabs) and outsourced semiconductor assembly and R&D investments and collaborative industry initiatives are key to propelling India's semiconductor sector forward, with significant investment commitments of over \$21 billion by the IESA member companies in last one year, said Ashok Chandak, President of IESA. At the two-day 'Utkarsh Odisha' – Make in Odisha Conclave 2025' here, the industry body also launched "India Semiconductor Market Report 2030" in the presence of Union Minister of Railways and Electronics and IT Ashwini Vaishnaw. The report highlighted key recommendations for achieving India's semiconductor ambitions, like continuing the 'Semicon India' programme beyond the initial outlay of \$10 billion and DLI scheme with some modifications.

"Instead, a robust supply and value chain must be built within India to minimise the impact of global fluctuations. This responsibility lies with both the government and the industry," he said.

The PM said the milestone of a USD5 trillion economy was not far away for India.

He said India's economy rests on two major pillars -- the innovative service sector and quality products.

"The potential for green jobs is also growing significantly. There is a need to adapt to the demands and requirements of the times. India is focusing on green technology and a green future, including solar, wind, hydro, and green hydrogen, which will power the energy security of a developed India," he said.

The PM said the aspirations of crores of people were driving India's movement on the path of development.

"Today, India is moving on a path of development driven by the aspirations of crores of people. This is an era of AI. However, the aspiration of India, not just AI, is the power of our country. Aspirationgrows when the needs of the people are fulfilled. In the last decade, the country has witnessed the benefit of empowering crores of people. Odisha represents the same aspiration," he said. Modi said the 21st century is about connected infrastructure and multi-modal connectivity.

"India is building specialised infrastructure at unprecedented speed and scale. It will make India a great destination for investment," he said.
