EU agrees to \$54bn in new aid for Ukraine as Hungary falls in line

Brussels: European Union leaders unanimously agreed on Thursday to extend €50 billion (\$54 billion) in new aid to Ukraine, overcoming weeks of resistance from Hungary and winning praise from Kyiv.

Before the summit started,



EU leaders piled pressure on Hungary to lift its block, telling PM Viktor Orban to pick sides in what

several saw as an existential challenge posed by Russia's war in Ukraine, the biggest conflict in Europe since WWII. "We have a deal. Unity," said European Council President Charles Michel in a post on X. "All 27 leaders agreed on an additional 50-billion-euro support package for Ukraine within the EU budget."

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky welcomed the agreement, saying the aid would strengthen long-term economic and financial stability of his country. The agreement comes after weeks of wrangling with Orban, who vetoed the aid package last December. There was no comment from Hungary. Diplomats said in exchange for the green light from Hungary, the bloc did not commit to releasing any of the billions of euros of EU funds intended for HungaHave proof Kyiv used US missiles to down jet with 'PoWs': Russia

ussian investigators said on Thursday they have evidence showing that Ukraine's military shot down a Russian II-76 military transport plane last week with US-made Patriot surface-to-air missiles. Russia said all 74 people on board, including 65 captured Ukrainian soldiers en route to be swapped for Russian prisoners of war, were killed, Russia's State Investigative Committee said in a statement that Ukrainian soldiers in the area of Lyptsi in the Kharkiv region had fired two missiles at the plane. "The fragments seized from the scene, according to their design features, geometric characteristics and available markings, are structural elements of the MIM-104A anti-aircraft guided missile of the Patriot complex of the US," the committee said. Maldives ties choppy, India doubles aid

espite the turbulence in bilateral ties with the Maldives, Delhi will continue to prioritise development projects in the Indian Ocean archipelago.

In terms of assistance to foreign governments, India revised its budget allocation for the Maldives in 2023-24 from Rs 400 crore to Rs 770 crore. And for 2024-25, it has earmarked Rs 600 crore for the Maldives, which is next only to Bhutan and Nepal.

India has not allowed differences with Male, most notably in defence and security cooperation, to affect work on the \$500 million Greater Male Connectivity Project, the largest infrastructure project in the country.All allocation for the Maldives is in the form of grant and not loan.

Like last year, Bhutan again topped the list of budgetary allocation, with India earmarking Rs 2,068 crore for Thimphu. The allocation for Nepal is Rs 700 crore.

India's overall estimate for assistance to foreign including governments, both grant and loan, for the year 2024-25 is Rs 5,667 crore, out of which Rs 4,677 crore is in the form of grant assistance and the remaining in the form of loan to Bhutan. This is about 874 crore less than the revised estimate for the previous year.

India's allocation for strife-torn Myanmar went down considerably from Rs 370 crore last year to Rs 250

crore for 2024-25.

Concerned about deteriorating Myanmar situation: Govt

New Delhi: As the Myanmar junta extended emergency in the country, India Thursday said it's concerned about the deteriorating situation which has "direct implications on us as a neighbouring country and a friend of Myanmar".

"India has been advocating for a complete succession of violence and Myanmar's transition towards inclusive federal democracy. We want an early resolution of the issue and re-

The military rulers had on Wednesday extended a state of emergency in the country that has been in place since the 2021 coup. According to a Reuters report, the junta has deployed heavy artillery and fighter jets to try to suppress militias allied with a shadow govt and ethnic minority armies, several of which launched a coordinated

offensive in Oct that stunned the military and has dented its battlefield credibility. "An inclusive solution to this crisis requires conditions that permit the people of Myanmar to exercise their human rights freely and peacefully. The military's campaign of violence targeting civilians and political repression must end, and those responsible be held to account," said the UN spokesperson on the issue. TNN

India: Deeply concerned about allegations of UN relief workers' hand in Hamas attack

New Delhi: The Indian govt said Thursday it's deeply concerned about Israel's allegations that UNRWA staff were involved in Hamas attacks on Israel, while welcoming a probe by the UN agency into the issue.

Unlike western countries, India has far not announced any cut in its funding of the UN agency, but it has continued to strongly condemn terrorist attacks by Hamas. India supports Palestine and Palestinian refugees through

its contributions to what is known as United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA) and has contributed more than \$36.5 million to the agency in the past 20 years.

"India is an important partner of Palestine. We have been extending assistance to them bilaterally and through the UN," said MEA spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal.

"But at the same time, we have a policy of zero tolerance towards terrorism and in that regard we are deeply concerned about the allegations that the UNRWA staff was involved in the Oct 7 ter-

ror attacks. We also welcome the investigations launched by the UN in this regard," added the official.

The official also said India had taken note of the ruling of the International Court of Justice that asked Israel to prevent death and destruction but stopped short of ordering an end to the military offensive.

The US, UK, Germany and Italy have already suspended funding to the agency which is said to have 13,000 employees in Gaza, most of them Palestinians.
