Protests, vandalism, arson continue to rock Manipur

Mobs Try To Storm Family Homes Of CM And A BJP MLA

Guwahati: Violence in Manipur escalated further on Thursday as large mobs defied curfew and attempted to storm the ancestral home of chief minister N Biren Singh in Imphal East and the residence of BJP legislator Kebi Devi in Imphal West, triggering hours-long battles between security forces and protesters.

To halt the mobs' progress in both locations, security forces resorted to tear-gas shelling. Manipur police said both houses were secure and adequately protected.

The protests began Tuesday over the disappearance and suspected killing of two students—17-year-old girl Hijam Linthoingambi and 20-year-old youth Phijam Hemjit—who were last seen together on a motorbike on July 6.

Over the past two days, clashes have been reported from multiple locations, leaving many people and more than a dozen police personnel wounded. Two students were wounded by pellets that security forces fired to disperse protesters marching towards the CM's official residence in Imphal city on Wednesday. A 97-year-old man was also wounded when he was struck by a stray bullet in the back.

The night-long violence continued into the early hours of Thursday, as a mob targeted Imphal West deputy commissioner's office, setting fire to three vehicles, one of which belonged to police. They assaulted a policeman and snatched his weapon. Mobs also blocked several roads within the city with burning tyres and logs.

Tribal banker attacked in Assam

A tribal from Manipur's Churachandpur working as manager of a public sector bank in Assam's Hailakandi district was attacked and seriously injured on Wednesday, reports BB Goswami. Three persons from another community have been held, though the main accused is absconding, Assam police said.

L Tun Khan Siam is in ICU with a head injury after being hit with bricks. Police, however, clarified that the assault had nothing to do with the ethnic strife in Manipur, but stemmed from a spat one of the accused had with the manager over opening an account.

Siam said in his FIR that he was shopping in the Lala area on his way back home from work when some persons started abusing him in English for his ethnicity and questioned why he was there. Siam said he ignored them and went to a nearby fish market. However, the men followed him, blocked his road and started assaulting him. Siam said his cries for help drew a crowd, and the attackers fled. Some organisations from the community to which the attackers belonged have condemned the assault.

Curfew will be temporarily lifted in Imphal East and West districts for six hours from 5am on Friday to allow residents to purchase essential items.

Peace rallies were organised by various student unions and they condemned the actions of security forces against protesters on Tuesday and Wednesday. The government formed a committee to investigate complaints of excessive force used on protesters, particularly students.

Security forces have used various measures, including tear gas shells, stun bombs, pepper sprays, electric shock batons, and batons, to control the protesters.

The Manipur Commission

for Protection of Child Rights has called upon security forces to exercise restraint and discourage the use of batons, tear gas, and rubber bullets "arbitrarily and abruptly" against teenagers.

"There were several protests and rallies in connection with the viral photos of dead bodies (purportedly) of two missing students. Miscreants in the crowd used iron pieces and stones (marbles) against security forces. In retaliation security forces used minimum force to disperse the congregation and fired some tear gas shells in which some people got injured," police tweeted.

Srinagar SSP repatriated to Manipur amid fresh unrest

New Delhi: Amid a fresh bout of violent protests in Manipur, this time over the kidnapping and killing of two students,

the central government has cut short the inter-cadre deputation of Srinagar's senior superin-



tendent of police (SSP) Rakesh Balwal, a Manipur cadre IPS officer, and repatriated him to his parent cadre.

Balwal, who led many important anti-terror operations as the Srinagar SSP while also getting a strong grip on the law and order situation there, will be returning to Manipur almost a year ahead of the end-date of his inter-cadre deputation. The Manipur government had sought his premature repatriation around 20 days back, as per sources.

The home ministry had approved Balwal's deputation to AGMUT cadre for three years in October 2021. However, sources said a need was felt lately to have more officers who are perceived as "neutral" amid the deep ethnic divide that has pitted local communities like Meitis and Kukis against one another. It was precisely for this reason that two key postings were made right at the outset of violence in Manipur - the appointment of retired IPS officer and CRPF ex-chief Kuldiep Singh as security adviser to Manipur government and and inter-cadre deputation of CRPF officer Rajeev Singh, a Tripura cadre officer. to lead the Manipur police.

Li's absence marked the first time he's missed an event he was expected to attend since US officials earlier this month said they had intelligence indicating he'd been removed from his post.

A Chinese defence ministry spokesperson, senior Col Wu Qian said in a one-sentence response Thursday that he was "not aware of the situation", in the ministry's first

public comments on the disappearance of the defence minister from public view.

Li hasn't been seen since giving a speech on August 29. He is the second senior official to disappear this year, following former foreign minister Qin Gang, who was removed

from office in July.

Qin Gang was also absent from Wednesday's meeting, where Xi urged officials to safeguard national security as China opens to

the outside world.

Li's disappearance and Qin's ouster have been fodder for Xi's critics. The disappearance of officials without explanation is not uncommon in China and often followed months later by the announcement of criminal charges against the person. The disappearance of two sitting ministers in rapid succession, though, is unusual. AGENCIES



Onus with private sector to lead country on sustainable growth path: NITI Aayog VC

THE Government is facilitating holistic development but the onus lies on the private sector to lead the country on a sustainable growth trajectory, NITI Aayog Vice-Chairman Suman Bery said on Wednesday.

The private sector contributes 40 per cent of Research and Development (R&D) in the country, while its share in developed countries is 70 per ing an event organised by the Public Affairs Forum of India (PAFI). "If we are to transit from the middle income trap, the private sector needs to enhance its contribution to R&D through its own investments and under corporate social responsibility," the NITI Aayog VC said.

The onus is on the private sector to lead us on a sustainable growth trajectory, Bery said. He said, the relationship between the public and private sectors needs to be redefined in the Amrit Kaal, to lead the country to a path of sustainable growth.

Bery further said that India's take-off moment has arrived, backed by the advantage of having the world's largest working population and resilient physical and digital institutions. "This is India's take-off moment. 1/5th of humanity will have rising living standards," he said.

"India is on the move, there is no doubt about it. India has the largest working age population in the world, (and) resilient physical and digital institutions," he said.

Beryalso pointed at the need to address significant challenges, including managing urbanisation, making regulations consistent and continuous, and adapting to disruptive technologies.

Noting that India has the advantage of having the largest arable land, Bery said the issue of raising agricultural productivity and having opportunities for displaced labour is a big challenge.

Taiwan reveals 1st domestically made submarine

Kaohsiung: Taiwan unveiled its first domestically developed submarine on Thursday, a major step in a project aimed at strengthening the island's deterrence against the Chinese navy, though it won't enter service for another two years. Taiwan, which China claims as its own territory, has made the indigenous submarine programme a key part of an ambitious project to modernise its armed forces. President Tsai Ing-wen, who initiated the plan in 2016, showed off the new submarines on Thursday in the southerncity of Kaohsiung. "In the past, a domestically developed submarine was considered an impossible task. But, today, a submarine manufactured by our country's people sits before our eyes," Tsai said. REUTERS

Ukrainian forces are 'gradually gaining ground': Nato chief

Kyiv: Nato secretary general Jens Stoltenberg, on an



unannounced visit to Kyiv, said on Thursday that Ukrainian forces were "gradual-

ly gaining ground" in their counteroffensive against Russian forces.

Speaking at a joint press conference with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky, Stoltenberg said "every metre that Ukrainian forces regain is a metre that Russia loses".

"And there is a stark contrast: Ukrainians are fighting for their families, their future, their freedom," he added. "Moscow is fighting for imperial delusions."

Zelensky stressed Ukraine's need for more air defence against Russian attacks, saying Moscow had used over 40 Shahed drones in strike's on Ukraine the previous night alone. "And so it is almost every night. In the conditions of such intense attacks against Ukrainians, against our cities, ports, we need a corresponding increase in pressure on Russia and a corresponding increase in our air shield," he said.

Stoltenberg said he was "constantly pushing" Nato allies to provide more sup-
