Amid US push, Ukraine & Russia signal openness to direct talks

oth Kremlin and President Volodymyr Zelensky of Ukraine suggested this week that they would be open to direct negotiations, making new but tentative diplomatic overtures as President Trump pushes for a peace deal.

Zelensky said on social media late Monday that Ukraine was "ready for any conversation" about a ceasefire that would halt strikes on civilian infrastructure. Dmitri Peskov, the Kremlin's spokesman, said on Tuesday that there were "nuances" in the Ukrainian proposal "that it makes sense to discuss" with Kyiv.

While Peskov said there were no concrete plans yet for direct talks between Moscow and Kyiv, the unusual public back-and-forth showed how both sides in the three-year war now seem eager to at least appear interested in negotiations - not least because of Trump's eagerness for a deal to end the war. Last week, in a sign of his impatience, the president had warned that if either Moscow or Kyiv "makes it very difficult" to reach a deal to end war, the US could decide that "we're just going to take a pass". Trump said Sunday he hoped Russia and Ukraine "will make a deal this week".

The warring sides haven't held public peace talks since the early weeks of Russia's

Putin offers to halt invasion along current frontline: Report

ussian President Putin has offered to halt his invasion of Ukraine across the current front line as part of efforts to reach a peace deal with US President Trump, the Financial Times reported on Tuesday citing people familiar with the matter. Putin told Steve Witkoff, Trump's special envoy, during a meeting in St Petersburg earlier this month that Moscow could relinquish its claims to areas of four partly occupied Ukrainian regions that remain under Kyiv's control, the report said citing three people familiar with the talks. full-scale invasion in 2022, though they have engaged behind the scenes, often through intermediaries. The new suggestion of bilateral talks came after Putin unexpectedly decla-

red a 30-hour ceasefire over the Easter weekend. Both sides accused each other of violating the temporary truce, but also confirmed that the intensity of the fighting did decline.

On Sunday, Zelensky proposed a monthlong ceasefire in which both sides would "cease any strikes using longrange drones and missiles on infrastructure. civilian "There were no air raid alerts on Easter, and some sectors of the front line remained quiet," he wrote in a post on Monday that reiterated the proposal. "This proves it is possible it's possible when Russia chooses to reduce the killing" Later, he told journalists: "Af ter the ceasefire, we are ready to sit down in any format.".

Putin responded on Monday in remarks to reporters, saying that further discussion was needed about how to define a civilian target, "possibly in a bilateral format". Peskov followed up to clarify that "the president specifically meant negotiations and discussions with the Ukrainian side."

But Russia's continued bombardment of Ukraine told a different story. A flurry of exploding drones or missiles hit Ukrainian cities Tuesday, the authorities said, setting buildings and cars on fire. Ukraine does not report successful strikes on military sites. NYT

US imposes tariffs up to 3,521% on solar imports from 4 SE countries

the US set new duties as high as 3,521% on solar imports from four Southeast Asian countries, delivering a win for domestic manufacturers while intensifying headwinds already threatening the country's renewable

power development.

The duties announced on Monday are the culmination of a yearlong trade probe that found solar manufacturers in Cambodia, Vietnam, Malaysia and Thailand were unfairly benefiting from govt subsidies and selling exports to the US at rates lower than the cost of production. The investigation was sought by domestic solar manufacturers and initiated under former President Biden.

While the duties are set to benefit domestic manufacturers, they also will pinch US renewable developers that have long relied on inexpensive

foreign supplies.

Countrywide duties were set as high as 3,521% for Cambodia, reflecting the country's decision to stop participating in the investigation, according to the commerce department. The US imported \$12.9 billion in solar equipment last year from the four countries that would be subject to the new duties, according to BloombergNEF. That represents about 77% of total module imports.

Companies not named in Vietnam face duties of as much as 395.9% with Thailand set at 375.2%. Countrywide rates for Malaysia were

posted at 34.4%. BLOOMBERG

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
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South Sudan Army recaptures town from White Army militia

THE South Sudan People's Defence Forces (SSPDF) has regained control of Nasir town in Upper Nile State, which it lost following intense fighting with the White Army militia since March. SSPDF Spokesperson Lul Ruai Koang confirmed on Sunday in a statement that the recapturing of the key town of Nasir is the greatest gift for servicemen who paid the ultimate price during its defence and recapture, Xinhua news agency reported.

In March, intense fighting broke out in the strategic town of Nasir between the South Sudan army and the White Army, a militia the government claims to be linked to the Opposition Sudan People's Liberation Movement-in-Opposition.

SSPDF's latest announcement came days after the military claimed control of the headquarters of neighbouring Ulang County following a week-long battle with the White Army.

Earlier in April the United Nations relief agency called for a rapid de-escalation to ensure the protection of civilians and unimpeded humanitarian access after fighting in South Sudan's Upper Nile State killed more than 180 people since March.

UN Humanitarian Coordinator for South Sudan Anita Kiki Gbeho said in a statement issued in Juba, the capital of South Sudan, that armed clashes and aerial bombardments have injured over 250 people and displaced an estimated 125,000.

PM cuts short Saudi visit after MbS meet; both condemn J&K strike

New Delhi: PM Narendra Modi cut short his two-day visit to Saudi Arabia and returned to India late in the night after finishing his official engagements with Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman (MbS), following the Pahalgam terror attack. Modi was originally scheduled to return on Wednesday night but was back in India early morning. He also skipped the official dinner hosted by the de facto ruler of the country.
