Dong Jun 3rd Consecutive Serving Or Ex-Def Win To Be Investigated

Beijing: China defence minister Dong Jun has been placed a wide-ranging anti-corruption probe that has roiled the

top ranks of the People's Liberation Army, the Financial Times reported on Wednesday.

Dong is the third consecutive serving or former Chinese defence minister to be inves-

tigated for alleged corruption, the FT reported, citing current and former US officials.

When asked about the FT report at a daily press briefing, Chinese foreign ministry spokesperson Mao Ning said it was "chasing shadows". China's defence ministry did not immediately comment. China's military has undergone a

sweeping anti-corruption purge since last year, with at least under investigation as part of nine PLA generals and a handfulor defence industry executives removed from the national

legislative body to date.

Dong, a former PLA navy chief, was appointed defence minister in Dec 2023. His predecessor, Li Shangfu. was removed after seven months into the



As defence minister, Dong is responsible for China's military diplomacy with other nations. He oversaw a recent thaw in US-China military-tomilitary ties, with both na-

tions holding theatre-level commander talks for the first time in Sept. But he was not promoted to the six-member Central Military Commission (CMC), China's highest-level military body, during a major Commissist Party plenum earlier his year. China's defence minister has traditionally been a member of both the CMC, which is headed by President Xi Jinping, and the State Council, China's cabinet-level executive body. Dong was not appointed to the state council either during a govt reshuffle in March.

Dong's two immediate predecessors, Li and Wei Fenghe, were expelled from the Communist Party in June for "serious violations of discipline", a euphemism for graft. REUTERS

Israel, Hezbollah agree on US-France-brokered deal

The truce does not address devastating war in the Gaza

TEL AVIV, Nov 27 (Agencies)

AFTER months of skirmishes and thousands of casualties, Israel and Hezbollah agreed to the ceasefire deal on Tuesday, brokered by US- and France and residents in cars heaped with belongings streamed back toward southern Lebanon despite warnings from the Israeli and Lebanese military that they stay away from certain areas.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, however, also stressed that the "length" of this ceasefire will depend on "what happens in Lebanon."

Netanyahu warns of action if Hezbollah violates agreement

"With the United States' full understanding, we maintain full freedom of military action. If Hezbollah violates the agreement and tries to arm itself, we will attack. If it tries to rebuild terrorist infrastructure near the border, we will attack. If it launches a rocket, if it digs a tunnel, if it brings in a truck carrying rockets, we will attack", Netanyahu noted.

He gave three reasons for having a ceasefire at this point.

"The first reason is to focus on the Iranian threat, and I won't expand on that. The second reason is to give our forces a breather and replenish (Contd on page 5)

Ceasefire will bring peace, stability in the region: India

NEW DELHI, Nov 27 (PTI)

INDIA on Wednesday welcomed the ceasefire between Israel and Lebanon and said it hoped that these developments will lead to "peace and stability" in the wider region.

The ceasefire between Israel and Lebanon-based Hezbollah began early Wednesday morning, according to reports.

"We welcome the ceasefire between Israel and Lebanon that has been announced. We have always called for de-escalation, restraint and return to the path of dialogue and diplomacy. We hope these developments will lead to peace and stability in the region," the Ministry of External Affair said.

UN welcomes agreement

UNITED NATIONS, Nov 27 (IANS)

THE United Nations welcomes the announcement of a ceasefire between Israel and Lebanon, a senior UN official said in a statement.

The agreement marks the starting point of a critical process, anchored in the full implementation of resolution 1701 (2006), to restore the safety and security that civilians on both sides of the Blue Line deserve, said Jeanine Hennis-Plasschaert, the UN special coordinator for Lebanon, on Tuesday, 'Xinhua' news agency reported.

Considerable work lies ahead to ensure the agreement endures, Hennis-Plasschaertsaid, adding, "Nothingless than the full and unwavering commitment of both parties is required."

'Nuclear-capable ballistic missile tested from INS Arighaat'

New Delhi: India is learnt to have tested a nuclear-capable submarine-launched ballistic missile (SLBM), designed for a strike range of 3,500-km, from the newly commissioned nuclear-powered submarine INS Arighaat on Wednesday, reports Rajat Pandit.

There was, however, no official word on the missile test that took place off Visakhapatnam in the Bay of Bengal in the morning. Sources said it was the solid-fuelled K-4 missile that was tested from the 6,000-tonne INS Arighaat. The K-4 has so far only been tested from submersible pontoons over the last several years.

A detailed analysis of Wednesday's test results will show whether the missile firing was actually a success and met the laid down trial objectives and parameters, the sources added.

A few days ago, India had issued a public area warning and notice to airmen (NOTAM) for an intermediate range missile test over a 3,490-km flight corridor in the Bay of Bengal between Nov 27 and 30.

INS Arighaat, the country's second nuclear-powered submarine with nuclear-tipped ballistic missiles (called SSBN in naval parlance), was commissioned on Aug 29. The submarine can carry K-4 missiles, unlike her forerunner INS Arihant forerunner INS Arihant armed only with 750-km range K-15 missiles.

India plans to induct the third SSBN, with a displacement of 7,000-tonne, as INS Aridhaman early next year.
