Naval Ship 'Nirdeshak' to be commissioned at Vizag on 18th

NEW DELHI, Lec 14 (PT)

THE Indian Navy's latest survey ship -- Indian Naval Ship (INS) Nirdeshak-- that boasts over "80 per cent indigenous content", reaffirming the naval force's focus towards Aatmanir bharta, is all set to be commissioned at Visakhapatnam on December 18, a senior official said on Friday.

The commissioning ceremony will be presided over by Minister of State for Defence Sanjay Seth.

"The Indian Navy is all set to commission its latest survey ship 'Nirdeshak' at Naval Dockyard, Visakhapatnam, on December 18," a Navy spokesperson said.

The ceremony will be hosted by the Flag Officer Commandingin-Chief, Eastern Naval Command and attended by distinguished guests, including senior naval officials and Garden Reach Shipbuilders and Engineers (GRSE) representatives.

The ship, built at Garden Reach Shipbuilders and Engineers (GRSE) Kolkata, proudly boasts over 80 per cent in digenous content, reaffirming India's expertise in ship design and construction and the Indian Navy's focus towards 'Aatmanirbharta', he said. The 110-meter-long vessel, with a displacement of approximately 3,800 tonnes, is powered by two diesel engines and is equipped with State-of-the-art hydrographic and oceanographic survey equipment.

'Nirdeshak', the second ship of the Survey Vessel (Large) Project, is designed to conduct hydrographic surveys, aid in navigation and support maritime operations.

Navy chief embarks on Indonesia visit

NAVY chief Admiral Dinesh K Tripathiwill begin a four-day visit to Indonesia from Sunday to consolidate a comprehensive strategic partnership, especially in the maritime domain, between the two countries.

Admiral Tripathi is scheduled to hold talks with Indonesia's top defence brass, including Defence Minister Lt Gen Sjafrie Sjamsoeddin (retd), Commander of Indonesian Armed Forces Gen Agus Subiyanto, and Navy Chief Admiral Muhammad Ali. "The discussions are expected to cover a broad spectrum of defence cooperation areas, particularly maritime security and joint training initiatives," Navy said.

UNSC flays Taliban ban on Afghan women's medical education

THE UN Security Council has said it was deeply concerned about the recent decision by Afghanistan's Taliban rulers to ban women from medical education, which could leave millions of women and girls without health care in the future.

The Council on Friday criticised "the increasing erosion" of human rights under the Taliban, especially for women and girls who have been denied access to education beyond the sixth grade, economic opportunities, participation in public life, freedom of movement and

other besics.

confirmed reports that Taliban leader Hibatullah Akhundzada ordered educational institutions to stop providing medical courses for women. In Afghanistan, women and girls can only be treated by female doctors and health professionals.

The Security Council criticised not only the medical education ban but the Taliban's "vice and virtue" directive issued in August that further restricts women's rights, including prohibiting their voices from being heard in public.

The resolution also extends

the mandate of the UN expert team monitoring sanctions against the Taliban for 14 months.

The Taliban seized power in Afghanistan in 2021 as US and NATO forces withdrew following two decades of war. No country officially recognises them as Afghanistan's Government.

The UN has said that recognition is almost impossible while bans on female education and employment remain in place and women can't go out in public without a male guardian.

Roza Otunbayeva said that women are "facing progressive erasure from almost all walks of life."

Sri Lankan President accepts Speaker Ranwala's resignation

COLOMBO, Dec 14 (PTI)

SRI Lankan President Anura Kumara Dissanayake on Saturday accepted the resignation of parliamentary Speaker Asoka Ranwala, who announced his decision to step down from the post amidst a controversy surrounding his educational qualifications. This is the first time in Sri Lanka's parliamentary history that a Speaker has resigned, according to the Adaderana news portal. Presidential Secretary Dr Nandika Sanath Kumanayake formally informed the Secretary General of Parliament that Dissanayake has accepted Ranwala's resignation, the Daily Mirror newspaper reported.

On Friday, Ranwala announced his resignation following days of speculation about him falsifying his educational qualifications. "...To stop the inconvenience caused to the government and the people who had placed trust in the government, I have

decided to resign from the post of Speaker," he said.

Ranwala's resignation came as the main opposition Samagi Jana Balawegaya (SJB) signed a motion of no trust against him, accusing him of misleading the public and the government by falsely claiming to possess a doctorate.

Government not to table 'ONOE' Bills in LS today

The revised list of business, issued by the Lok Sabha secretariat, does not have the two Bills on the agenda for Monday.

However, the Government can always bring in legislative agenda to Parliament at the last minute through 'Supplementary List of Business' with the permission of the Lok Sabha Speaker. The two Bills related to implementation of the simultaneous elections to Lok Sabha and state assemblies have been circulated among members last week as per the rules of procedure. The Winter session of Parliament is scheduled to conclude on December 20.

SEOUL, Dec 14 (ANI)

SOUTH Korean President Yoon Suk Yeol has been impeached by the National Assembly over his attempt to impose martial law in the country. The members of the unicameral National Assembly on Saturday voted 204 to 85 to impeach South Korea's President, the second such vote in eight days.

Three members of the National Assembly abstained from voting while eightvotes were declared invalid. The voting was conducted through secret ballot, with two-thirds of the vote needed for impeachment. Audible gasps were heard from the chamber after the result of voting was announced.

Thousands of protesters, gathered outside the assembly, welcomed the announcement with applause and loud cheers.
