India, UK to hold next round of talks on proposed trade agreement this month

NEW DELHI, July 7 (PTI)

WITH THE new Government taking charge in Britain, senior officials of India and the UK will hold the nextround of talks this month for the proposed free trade agreement to resolve the pending issues and close the negotiations, an official said. The India-UK talks for the proposed free trade agreement (FTA) began in January 2022. The 14th round of talks stalled as the two nations stepped into their general election cycles.

The official said the two sides are in touch, and the next round would start this month only.

Britain's newly-elected Prime Minister Keir Starmer spoke to Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Saturday and said he stood ready to conclude an FTA that worked for both sides.

The two leaders agreed to work towards the early conclusion of a mutually beneficial India-UK FTA. There are pending issues in both the goods and services sectors.

The Indian industry is demanding greater access for its skilled professionals from sectors like IT and healthcare in the UK market, besides market access for several goods at nil customs duty. On the other hand, the UK is seeking a significant cut in import duties on goods such as scotch whiskey, electric vehicles, lamb meat, chocolates and certain confectionary items.

Britain is also looking for more opportunities for UK services in Indian markets in segments like telecommunications, legal and financial services (banking and insurance). The two countries are also negotiating a bilateral investment treaty (BIT).

There are 26 chapters in the agreement, which include goods, services, investments and intellectual property rights.

The bilateral trade between India and the UK increased to USD 21.34 billion in 2023-24 from 20.36 billion in 2022-23.

The Labour Party's election manifesto for the recent polls also committed to clinching the deal. The new Starmer-led Government's new Foreign Secretary David Lammy is also on the record saying that he wants to finish the job on the FTA and plans to visit India within the first month of being elected.

Austria visit will strengthen close ties: PM Medi

PRIME Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday said that his visit to Austria, starting July 9, will further strengthen the 'ever-close partnership' between the two nations.

Ahead of his visit to Austria. Prime Minister Narendra Modi said on Sunday the shared values of democracy, freedom and the rule of law form the bedrock upon which the two countries will build an ever-closer partnership. Modi's remark came a day after Austrian Chancellor Karl Nehammer posted on 'X', "I very much look forward to welcoming Narendra Modi, the Prime Minister of India, the world's largest democracy, next week in Vienna." "This visit is a special honour as it marks the first visit by an Indian PM in over 40 years and a significant milestone as we celebrate 75 years of diplomatic relations with India," he said.

"We will have the opportunity to talk about further deepening our bilateral relationship on the many geopolitical challenges," the Austrian chancellor said. Responding to Nehammer, Modi said, "Thank you, Chancellor Karl Nehammer. It is indeed an honour to visit Austria to mark this historic occasion. I look forward to our discussions on strengthening bonds between our nations."

Swain, the Jammu and Kashmir Director General of Police, asserted that his force along with other security agencies is committed and determined to eliminate terrorism in the Union Territory.



police chief said people are fully sooperating with the security sencies and it is a matter of time when the terrorists start getting eliminated. Three foreign terrorists were killed in a gunfight in RR Swain the Gandoh area of the

Doda district on June 26. This was the first encounter in Gandohin more than a decade.

Without naming Pakistan, Swain said, "Our adversary and enemy has posed a challenge, thinking that this is a border

area and they can take advantage of it by pushing foreign terrorists to revive militancy by



The DGP, who was accompanied by Additional Director General of Police (law and order) Vijay Kumar and ADGP (Jammu zone) Anand Jain, said the foreign mercenaries do not belong to anyone and they also

do not fall in the ambit of law.

"They are involved in mass killings, taking sheep without paying money and their aim is to create fear and force the public into submission and create disturbance. But it cannot be achieved because the people are with us and we will fight them out," the DGP said.

"Police and its security partners are fully determined and committed to defeating the terrorists with the active support of village defence guards, SPOs and commoners. It is only a question of time when they will start getting killed, and they will start getting eliminated," he added.



Macron votes in legislative elections that could force him to share power

PARIS, July 7 (AP)

FRENCH President Emmanuel Macron voted in high-stakes



legislative elections on Sunday that could force him to share power with the rising far right.

Macron called the surprise vote after the antiimmigration, nationalist National Rally made huge gains in the June 9 European elections, tak-

ing a huge gamble that French voters would block the far-

right party as they always have in the past.

But the National Rally instead won a larger share than ever in the first round on June 30, and its leader Marine Le Pen called on voters to give the party an absolute majority in Round 2. Sunday's vote determines which party controls the National Assembly and who will be Prime Minister. If no party wins an absolute majority, forming a Government comes only after extensive negotiations. The snap elections in this nuclear-armed nation will influence the war in Ukraine, global diplomacy and Europe's economic stability, and they're almost certain to undercut President Emmanuel Macron for the remaining three years of his presidency.

Wickremesinghe to contest Presidential polls as independent

COLOMBO, Jul 7 (PTI)

SRI Lankan President Ranil Wickremesinghe will contest the Presidential election as an independent candidate, his aide said on Sunday.

Deputy Chairman of the United National Party Ruwan Wijewardene confirmed that the Presidential election will definitely be held and Wickremesinghe, 75, will contest the election as an independent candidate, News 1st reported. "Onlyone leader possesses the knowledge to solve Sri Lanka's economic crisis. That is Ranil Wickremesinghe. He has proved it with his actions," he was quoted as saying by the news portal.

In April 2022, the island

In April 2022, the island nation declared its first-ever sovereign default since gaining



Independence from Britain in 1948. The unprecedented financial crisis led President Gotabaya Rajapaksa to quit office in 2022 amid civil unrest over his inability to handle the crisis. In July 2022, Wickremesinghe was elected through parliament to become stop-gap president for the balance term of Rajapaksa.

Wickremesinghe, also the finance minister, hasn't made any public statem at on his bid for re-election.

"This election isn't merely outselecting individuals but about choosing the most effective system for our country's progress. If you believe in the merits of the current approach, let us proceed accordingly," the President's Media Division quoted him as saying earlier.

The Government under Wickremesinghe has set in place hard economic reforms as dictated by the International Monetary Fund (IMF) programme. President Wickremesinghe last month said that his government has finalised a long-delayed debt restructuring agreement for USD 5.8 billion with its bilateral lenders, including India and China, in Paris to meet a key condition of an IMF bailout.

SL Election Commission to announce presidential poll date by July end

COLOMBO, July 7 (PTI)

SRI Lanka's Election Commission on Sunday said that it will announce the date for the next presidential poll before the end of this month.

Election Commission Chairman R M A L Ratnayake said the electoral body would be legally empowered after July 17 to announce the date for the election. The Election Commission in May said the presidential election would be conducted between September 17 and October 16.

Ratnayake said the commission is currently in the processof putting final touches to the 2024 electoral register which will be the basis for the election. Over 17 million would be eligible to vote in the election as per the revised list, officials said.

His comments came ahead of a court case scheduled for Monday on holding the election. Last week, an individual filed a fundamental rights petition urging the court to hold back the election until a clarification could be made on an ambiguity in the presidential term about articles 30(2) and 82 in the Constitution.

Hindenburg shared Adani report with client two months before publishing it

NEW DELHI, July 7 (PT)

US SHORT-SELLER Hindenburg Research had shared an advance copy of its damning report against Adani group with New York-based hedge fund manager Mark Kingdon about two months before publishing it and profited from a deal to share spoils from share price movement, according to market regulator Sebi.

The Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI), in its 46-page show cause notice to Hindenburg, detailed how the US short seller, the New York hedge fund and a broker tied to Kotak Mahindra Bank benefited from the over USD 150 billion routs in the market value of Adani group's 10 listed firms post-publication of the report.

SEBI charged Hindenburg of making "unfair" profits from "collusion" to use "nonpublic" and "misleading" information and induce "panic selling" in Adani Group stocks.

Hindenburg, which made public the SEBInotice, in its response, has described the show cause as an attempt to "silence and intimidate those who expose corrup-

Alaska's top-heavy glaciers are approaching an irreversible tipping point

THE MELTING of one of North America's largest icefields has accelerated and could so in reach an irreversible tipping point. That's the conclusion of new research colleagues and I have published on the Juneau Icefield, which straddles the Alaska-Canada border near the Alaskan capital of Juneau.

In the summer of 2022, I skied across the flat, smooth and white plateau of the icefield, accompanied by other researchers, sliding in the tracks of the person in front of me under a hot sun. From that plateau, around 40 huge, interconnected glaciers descend towards the sea, with hundreds of smaller glaciers on the mountain peaks all around.



Our work, now published in Nature Communications, has shown that Juneau is an example of a climate "feedback" in action: as temperatures are rising, less and less snow is remaining through the summer (technically: the "end-of-summer snowline" is rising). This in turn leads to ice being exposed to sunshine and higher temperatures, which means

more melt, less snow, and so on.

Like many Alaskan glaciers, Juneau's are topheavy, with lots of ice and snow at high altitudes above the end-of-summer snowline. This previously sustained the glacier tongues lower down. But when the end-of-summer snowline does creep up to the top plateau, then suddenly a large amount of a top-heavy glacier will be newly exposed to melting.

That's what's happening now, each summer, and the glaciers are melting much faster than before, causing the icefield to get thinner and thinner and the plateau to get lower and lower. Once a threshold is passed, these feedbacks can accelerate melt and drive a self-perpetuating loss of snow and ice which would continue even if the world were to stop warming.
