Heavy rains lash Himachal, Punjab, Haryana

Landslides, flash floods block 288 roads in HP

SHIMLA, Aug 11 (PTI)

LANDSLIDES and flash floods triggered by heavy rains over the last two days has led to the closure of more than 280 roads in Himachal Pradesh, with 150 being closed on Saturday, according to officials.

Water from overflowing streams has entered several houses in Una while the Lahaul and Spiti police have issued an advisory for residents and travellers to exercise extreme caution and not to cross the Jahalman Nallahas its water level is "rapidly" rising, they said.

Rescue operations to trace about 30 people who went missing after the July 31 flash floods in Kullu, Mandi and Shimla district are being conducted but there has been no major success. So far, 28 bodies have been recovered, the officials said. More than 100 people have been killed in rain-related incidents, and the state has suffered losses of about Rs 842 crore between June 27 and August 9, they said.

The officials said of the 288 roads, 138 were closed on Friday and 150 on Saturday.

State emergency operation centre data stated that 96 roads have been closed in Mandi, 76 in Shimla, 37 in Kullu, 33 in

Sirmaur, 26 in Chamba, seven in Lahaul and Spiti, five in Hamirpur, and four each in Kangra and Kinnaur.

Kinnaur district has been cut off from State capital Shimla following flash floods between Pooh and Kaurik and a landslide on the National Highway 5 near Negulsariin.

The officials said 458 power and 48 water supply schemes are also affected in the state.

The regional meteorological office on Sunday issued an 'orange' alert, the warning for heavy to very rainfall at isolated places in in five districts -- Bilaspur, Chamba, Hamiprpur, Kullu, Kangra, Mandi, Shimla, Solan, Sirmaur and Una.

Rainfall in parts of Punjab, Haryana

RAINS lashed many parts of Punjab and Haryana on Sunday, bringing respite from humid weather conditions.

Mohali, Ludhiana, Amritsar, Rupnagar and Ambala were among the places that received rainfall.

Pathankot received 82 mm ofrainfall, Gurdaspur 68.8 mm and Amritsar 57.6 mm in the last 24 hours which ended at 8:30 am, a meteorological department report said.

In Haryana, Ambala recorded 83.8 mm of rainfall, Karnal 36.8 mm, Sirsa 20 mm and Hisar 6 mm during the same period. Chandigarh, the common capital of the two States,

received 28.8 mm of rainfall.

House collapses following rains in Raj, 2 killed

A 40-YEAR-OLD man and his son were killed and two others injured when their house collapsed following heavy rain in Rajasthan's Karauli district early Sunday, officials said.

The incident happened in Dolikhar Mohalla of the city when a family was sleeping in their house.

"Two people died in the incident whereas two others were injured. The injured are being treated at a hospital," Principal Medical Officer of the Karauli district hospital, Dr Ramkesh Meena told reporters.

He said the deceased have been identified as Zakir Khan and his son Rashid Khan (12). He said the bodies will be handed overto family members after post-mortem. Heavyrainfallwas recorded in parts of Rajasthan, including Dausa, Bharatpur, Sawai Madhopur, Kota, Baran and Karauli districts, a MeT department spokesperson said.

Committed to resolve Mizoram-Assam border row: Laiduhoma

AIZAWL, Aug 11 (PTI)

MIZORAM Chief Minister Lalduhoma on Saturday said his Government was committed to resolve the State's border dispute with neighbouring Assam and ensure peace along the boundary. During a brief meeting with an Assam delegation, leaders of both States must work together with aheartfelt desire for peace and to resolve the border dispute between the two northeastern states, an official statement said.

His Government is "desirous of resolving the inter-state boundary dispute during the current term", Lalduhoma said in the statement. Led by State Border Protection and Development Minister Atul Bora, the Assam delegation paid a courtesy call on Lalduhoma at his official residence in Aizawl on Saturday.

Lalduhoma said that several meetings were held between the two States in the past and the "decisions were mainly adhering to status quo, which was not the right step towards establishing lasting peace but delaying the peace process and resolving the border dispute amicably". "Official-level talks may continue between the two states.But what is important most is that leaders should make collective efforts, with the intention of finding peace to resolve the border dispute," Lalduhoma said.

Stopped recruiting Indians into military since April: Russia

NEW DELHI, Aug 11 (PTI)

THE Russian embassy op Saturday condoled the "unortunate instances of Indian casualties in the course of Moscow's "special military operation" in Ukraine and said recruitment of Indians into its Armed Forces was stopped since April. In a statement, the embassy said Moscow and New Delhi are working in close coordination for early "identification and discharge" of Indian nationals who voluntarily joined contractual work in the military service and now want to return home.

Since April this year, the ministry of defence of the Russian Federation has stopped recruiting citizens of a number of foreign countries, including India, into the military service, it said. External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar on Friday said in Lok Sabha that a total of 69 Indian citizens are currently awaiting release from the Russian Army. Eight Indians have died while serving with the Russian Army, according to official data, "The Russian Embassy in New Delhi has been in receipt of numerous requests from the media to comment on the issue of Indian citizens in service in the Armed Forces of the Russian Federation as there unfortunate been instances of casualties among them in the course of the Special military operation in Ukraine," the embassy said. "The embassy expresses deep condolences India and the families of the deceased," it said.

Jaishankar is on a three-day official visit to the Maldives to reset the bilateral relationship, the first high-level trip from India after the archipelago nation's pro-China President Muizzu assumed office last year.

"Great pleasure towarmlywelcome and meet Indian External Affairs Minister @DrSJaishankar to the Maldives with my colleagues from @MDPSecretariat," Shahid, the former Foreign Minister, said in a statement posted on 'X' late Saturday night.

"The Maldives has always been confident that India will always be the first responder any time the Maldives "dials an international 911"," he said.

He said the "current Government's initial stoking of anti-India sentiments through aggressive slogans, mockery and the branding of a time-tested friend and development partner as a regional bully, has caused a decline in the Maldives international standing, economic loss, and many other unnecessary difficulties, and challenges."

"With this in mind, the MDP welcomes the sudden recalibration of the Maldives-India policy of President Muizzu's government, from its previous India Out policy," Shahid said.

Zelenskyy indirectly confirms INCURSION onto Russian soil

KYIV, Aug 11 (AP)

DAYS after Ukraine began a surprise mintary incursion into Russia's Kursk border region, Zelenskyy broke the Government's silence on it late Saturday by indirectly acknowledging ongoing military actions to "push the war out into the aggressor's territory" in his nightly address.

Overnight into Sunday, a Russian drone and missile barrage on Kyiv killed two people including a 4-year-old boy. In Russia, Kursk's regional Governor said that a Ukrainian missile shot down by Russian air defences fell on a residential building, wounding 13 people.

Russia attacked Ukraine with four ballistic missiles and 57 Shahed drones, Ukraine's Air Force said. Air defences shot down 53 drones. The bodies of a 35-year old man and his son were found under rubble after fragments of missiles fell on a residential area in Kyiv's suburban Brovary district, according to Ukraine's State Emergency Service on Sunday. Another three people in the district were also injured in the attack.

Hasina reveals her undelivered speech

NEW DELHI, Aug 11 (IANS)

FORMER Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina has revealed that she could have remained in power if she had "surrendered" the sovereignty of Saint Martin Island and "allowed America to hold sway over the Bay of Bengal", media reports said.

Disclosing the contents of her undelivered speech in India, where Hasina flew on August5amidviolent protests in her country, the 76-year-old leader said that she resigned so that she does not have to see a "procession of dead bodies". These revelations are part of her undelivered speech, which she wanted to make but could not happen as protesters reached her residence and she was forced to flee the country.

The former Prime Minister

said she is pained over her party Awami League being targeted but said



she "will return to Bangladesh soon". She said that she would pray for the future of Bangladesh. "I resigned so that I did not have to see the procession of dead bodies. They wanted to come to power over the dead bodies of students, but I did not allowit. I resigned from premiership. I could have remained in power if I had surrendered the sover-

remained in power if I had "surrendered" the sovereignty of Saint Martin Island and allowed America to hold sway over the Bay of Bengal. I resigned so that I

do not have to see a procession of dead bodies.

eignty of Saint Martin Island and allowed America to hold sway over the Bay of Bengal. I beseech to the people of my land, please do not be manipulated by radicals," her undelivered speech says. The undelivered speech says, "If I had remained in the country, more lives would have been lost more resources would have been destroyed. I made the extremely difficult decision to exit. I became your leader because you chose me, you were my strength."

In May, Hasina had claimed that "conspiracies" were being hatched to topple her Government and alleged a "white man's" plot to carve a new "Christian country" out of Bangladesh. Hasina had claimed that if she allowed a certain country to build an airbase in Bangladesh, then she would have had no problem. Bangladesh saw protests against job quotas that snowballed into a wider movement against the Bangladesh i leadership, forcing Sheikh Hasina to resign from the Prime Minister's post.

Over 400 people lost their lives in the protests since mid-July. fter Hasina's departure to India, Nobel laureate and microfinance pioneer Muhammad Yunus took over as the head of the interim Government on Thursday and assured that the new regime would not only restore peace in the country but also ensure the protection of Hindus and other minorities. Amid massive student protests demandjudiciary's revamp, Bangladesh Chief Justice Obaidul Hassan and five other top judges were forced to resign on Saturday.
